Charming indoor and outdoor dining spaces overlook the Story Bridge and the Brisbane River, with a terrace dining experience that combines fresh local and sustainable produce.

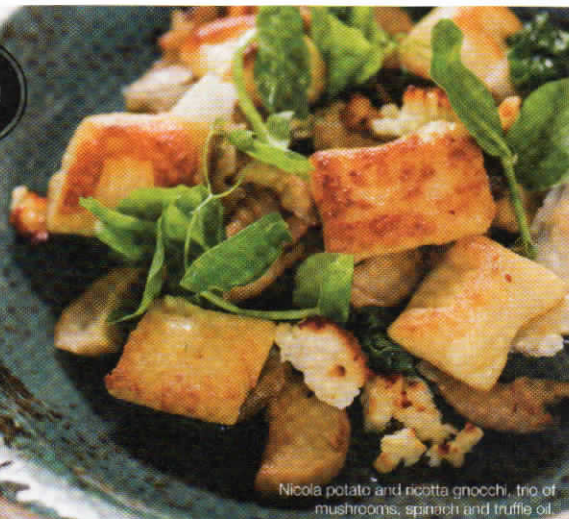

Focusing on shiitake and oyster mushrooms due

to their flavour and texture, the homegrown fungi feature on the new Let's Do Lunch menu served with soft mascarpone, polenta and parmesan. This menu includes an entrée, main and a glass of wine for only \$38 per person.
